

YOUNG LEEDS DANCERS OFF TO CANADA

15 members of a youth dance project from the Northern School of Contemporary Dance in Leeds are heading off to Canada at the end of July to take part in a prestigious international Festival.

The group called Advance, will be spending a week at the 'Dance and the Child International' conference in Regina, central Canada. This major event takes place every three years at venues all over the world, and aims to promote the growth and development of dance for young people throughout the world.

The 15 young people are aged between 12 and 16 and come from all over the Leeds area. They have been working hard for the last few months creating a dance piece to take to Canada, based on a T. S Eliot poem. As well as performing at the conference the group will also take part in dance workshops and meet other youth groups from all over the world.

The trip is being funded entirely by Northern School Of Contemporary Dance, a Higher Education College which runs full- time dance training courses. ADVANCE is part of the College's extensive community dance programme.

NSCD Community Dance worker, Pam Johnson, said: 'this is a wonderful opportunity for these young people to meet other dancers and perform their work on a international stage. They will learn a great deal and the experience will stay with them for the rest of their lives. The trip takes place from 31 July - 8 August 2000.

BLACK YOUTH CHARTER

On Wednesday 19th July,2000 at 11.00 am, the National Black Youth Forum (NBYF)

launched the Black Youth Charter at the House of Commons. The NBYF is made up of black young people between the ages of 14 - 21 yrs, who represent the diverse black and minority community from across Britain today. The Charter was spearheaded by events like the racist murder of Stephen Lawrence and the growing concerns of mistreatment, in-justice and lack of equal rights awarded to Black young people in British society today.

The NBYF decided that they would devise a Charter for Black young people, which restates the 'United Nation Convention on the Rights of the child', but to redesign it to reflect the fact that too often Black young people are denied their rights on a regular basis. The Chapeltown Community Centre Senior Youth Club, based in Chapeltown in Leeds (part of Leeds Councils ICP & R Community Youth Service) received an invitation to send some black young people to represent Black youngsters of Leeds. Those chosen to attend were Chandelle Morris, Leanne Daniel and Natasha Mills. They are well known young women in Chapeltown, who are active members of the Youth Club, involved in volunteering on Play Schemes, fund raising for local causes, and have contributed to a number of surveys on Black young people's attitudes, so they are good representatives to send to the launch party.

The event was supported by Fabian Hamilton Labour MP for Leeds North East, who showed great interest in the launch and was fully supportive of the initiative. He also invited the young people from chapeltown back for personal guided tour around the House of Commons, the young people have vowed to him to take up on his offer. Oona King, MP was supposed to launch the event, but due to ill health she was unavailable. Also present was Simone Hughes Liberal Democrat representative for Southwart and Burmondsey, he booked the venue and explained he was a human rights supporter and ex - Youth Leader, to which he received a round of applause. There where also

representatives from National Black organisations lending their support to the initiative.

Each member of the NBYF talked through the key issues identified in the charter, explaining they reflected the experiences faced by black young people in the communities they came from , these included issues relating to Education, ,Employment, Health, Police and Politics, to name a few.

The intention for the future is to organise a Yorkshire regional chapter of the NBYF whereby local black young people from all the different communities can have a input into Urban Regeneration developments, to create sustainable communities and longer lasting changes. And where Black young people's voices and ideas are put into practice.

The NBYF model for black young people is for them to take an active part in their communities and not one of being passive contributors, hence the launch at the House of Commons, the centre of legislative and decision making in the UK.

CAREER PROFILE WITH MR RANDOLPH MORTON, AT LATCH

Randolph started out with Frontline Self Build in 1989, when he did all his training and joinery skills. Randolph said: 'I found this a great experience, working with groups of people from the Chapeltown community. At present I'm working with Latch Self - Build Project at 1 Leopold Street. The building is due to be finished in September/ October this year. I see Latch as a stepping stone; they have offered me just what I've been looking for, this is a great opportunity to gain a lot of experience, I still work with Frontline on a voluntary basis and I'll always be there for them.

Latch gives youngsters a chance in life, as they also cater for disadvantaged people, between 18-25 of age, homeless, unemployed people, youngsters disillusioned by society and people with personal problems. Youngsters spend two days at college and three days on site, and are allowed to earn £15.00 per week'. After leaving school in 1976, Randolph worked in Engineering, he did an apprenticeship for 4 years, then joined Doncaster Monkbridge and made areoblades for British Airways. In 1982 due to redundancy, Randolph further stated: 'I went back to college and did a year in welding, I then worked three years at Jackson's Catering, working with Stainless Steel and Coppers, fixing cookers, fridges, commercial and domestic appliances for big firms.

In the near future I see myself, getting more involved on a community level. When I'm out driving the Latch vehicle, young people often stop me, and ask me what is Latch all about, hopefully, as I am working at Latch I will be able to encourage more local involvement.


Inam Helps Over 100 Businesses in Chapeltown and Harehills

INTERVIEW WITH VINCE WILKINSON (Team Leader for Leeds Mentoring)

Vince states that the project was formed since 1998 and is based at the Elmette Centre, Leeds 8. He said: 'We work with children and schools in the SRB3 area: (Chapeltown, Burmantofts, university and Harehills wards). We also work with children who are residents in these areas, but go to schools in different parts of the city.

The SRB mentoring project works in partnership with Leeds City Council, the University of Leeds and Businesses in the Community. Its aim is to improve the educational achievement and enhance career prospects.

We are looking for mentors, especially black, male role models from the community to work with young people in schools, colleges and training organisations on a one - to - one basis. Our mentors are drawn from professional and business sectors to work on a voluntary basis; basically anyone who is non - judgmental, friendly, supportive, a good listener and is prepared to work with young people to help them overcome social and educational barriers, is welcome to become a mentor.

All our mentors working with young people are vetted by the police and undergo training leading to a recognised qualification. Our accredited mentor -training programme with Leeds Metropolitan University, leads to a qualification ranging from a vocational certificate in mentoring to Masters level. We meet the course fees for all our members in addition to SR. mentoring programme. We also recruit and match mentors with pupils from schools participating in the 'Excellence in Cities' programme, and New Deal mentors normally meet their mentees about 18 times a year (once every two weeks) for one to one sessions, which deal with the issues of interest brought by the mentee.

The relationship is confidential, mentors can help with a range of issues, affecting young peoples ability to achieve their maximum potential in school; a mentor can help young people to gain self confidence in academic work, personal organisation, becoming self motivated, developing good interpersonal skills, and making the school experience more attractive. We need more young people to participate in the scheme and more parent involvement

The benefits to the mentee relates to his or her differing needs and aspirations. Depending on the various stages of development, the benefits include Improved personal, and social skills, Improved motivation to learn, Taking responsibility for own learning, Raising educational achievement, Improved ability to handle relationships, Increased self esteem and self confidence, Personal empowerment, Increased awareness of job opportunities and career expectations, Becoming more employable, career development, Personal growth and development

The following are typical examples of the mentoring experience from the mentees perspective,

'my mentor gives me a lot of encouragement and something to aspire to. I never really had any one to help me in this way before.

My mentor is someone who helps me understand the importance of school and work. My mentor is a person who takes an interest in what I do,

My mentor is someone I could talk to, she listens and I trust her.

He always helps me to plan my activities and organise my school work.'

This brought me greater recognition and contacts to such an extent that other editors of magazines, libraries, radio stations and television companies have become interested. 
