

The Ridings Housing Association

Bill Brown, Chairman of BME TARAN, an organisation providing an advisory network for black and ethnic minorities, tenants and residence associations based in the Midlands said: "The event is an example of good practice, seeing black led community organisations and a local landlord working together. I want to praise the Ridings for the role they have played in supporting the event and for their commitment to involving black communities. The Ridings have truly embraced the value of diversity in their communities and it is an indicator of their proactive approach, they are one of the few housing associations in the country I am aware of who can point to a black convenor on their Residents Federation. I hope the Ridings will be able to sustain this level of involvement.

Home Office Minister Praises Community Project

Charles Clarke MP, Minister of State at the Home Office, praised the work of an inner city Leeds anti crime project when he visited the City on Wednesday 22nd November.

Mr Clarke who has special responsibility for crime reduction, criminal policy and action against drugs addressed the first AGM of community action and support against crime (CASAC) at the Leeds West Indian Centre in Chapeltown. He spoke on the role of community safety partnerships in the UK's inner cities. Mr Clarke says "The future of the local community safety groups is very much a proactive one, as they often come up with innovative new approaches to tackle crime and disorder. The Government encourages crime and disorder—

partnerships to work with local community groups in implimenting specific crime reduction measures". 2 "CASAC has demonstrated this by running innovative workshops on domestic violence, coordinating community safety projects and working with young people to reduce crime. It is only by finding effective local solutions which local people believe in, that we can make a real impact. Travis Johnson OBE, Chair of CASAC added; "We are pleased to have Home Office Minister, Charles Clarke as our guest speaker. His presence highlights the importance of community safety issues and is a clear acknowledgement of CASAC's achievements in this field".


SURE START THE 4TH WAVE, CHAPELTOWN



LEEDS ARCHWAY CENTRE,

WHICH PROVIDES HOMES AND PRACTICAL SUPPORT FOR YOUNG PEOPLE, OFFICIALLY OPENED ON DECEMBER 1

The purpose built archway resource centre in Harehills, Leeds which helps young people in the inner city who have little, or no, support to find a home and live independently was officially opened on Friday December 1st. Councillor, Alec Hudson, Deputy Leader of Leeds City Council and Chairman of the projects Board of Directors, performed the opening ceremony. Archway is run by Leeds Partnership Charitable Homes, a non profitmaking housing organisation, which has developed more than 4000 homes in the City during the past 10 years. Through the work of the partnership, over 10,000 people have been provided with good quality modern homes. Built at a cost of 1m. on the site of the former Gaiety Cinema, - the resource centre assists young people, including single parents, aged between 16 and 25, who are living or want to live in Chapeltown, Harehills, Lincoln Green, Little London or Woodhouse areas of Leeds.

The Centre's first priority is to help young people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. They may be staying in a hostel or receiving support through Archway's Housing Support Scheme, which helps young people to obtain the tenancy of a Housing Association property and gives them practical support in living independently. All the services of the centre are free of charge to eligible young

people, who can apply for membership simply by going to the centre or can be refered by another agency. Archway also provides excellent trainig and advisory sevices, including a cyber suite equipped with multimedia computers, all with internet access. Members also have exclusive use of a laundry room. Other activities include groups looking at living skills, health and supporting parents. A creche is also available. Staff from Leeds Citizens Advice Bureau visit twice a week and the centre is a community legal service information point for young people. Workers from other agencies also visit Archway to help with specialist areas including employment and training, health and drug related issues. Richard Norton, Director of the project, heads a team of 22 staff, all of whom have specific skills in working with young people. He comments:' we provide a friendly focal point for the co ordinated delivery of support services to young people. Many of our users need help in finding somewhere to live but they need much more than bricks and mortar. They want to be independent but often require advice and practical support in achieving that.' They also need to be encouraged to use our services and equipment to enable them to gain practical skills and increase their confidence, which in turn will help them to find a job. Our work is beginning to attract attention from other Housing Organisations and support agencies, who recognise the fresh approach we are taking. 

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Commedia Millennium Awards

A groundbreaking new media initiative, the Commedia Millennium Awards, is to be funded by the Millennium Commission with a total lottery grant of £970,000. 225 of these awards of between £1,000 and £5,000 are available to individuals to communicate an issue or idea through radio, TV, the internet or via audio CD. This offers individuals the opportunity of addressing an issue of concern or interest which is of benefit to the community as well as gaining media training and publicising their work or cause. Each award winner will work with a local community media organisation to realise their idea. The local partner will support the individual with a custom made package which include training, mentoring, production support, equipment hire, assistance in broadcasting and distributing the final production. Productions will be broadcast by local partners on community radio and television, and will also be available over the Internet.

A pilot round of Commedia Awards was launched in Yorkshire and Humberside before going nationwide with the first round (of 6) launching in November 2000 with a closing date at the end of January 2001.

Chandelle goes to 10 Downing Street

On Monday 20th November 2000 a group of young people from Chapeltown Community Centre, Senior Youth Club attended the official launch of the National Black Youth Forum (NBYF) in London - Chandele Morris, Leanne Daniel's and Natasha Mills). The event marked the inaugural meeting of NBYF representing all Black and minority ethnic young people from across the country, representing the spectrum of multi-cultural Britain. The report reflects many of the issues facing black young people in Britain, today. The group met at Trafalgar Square, then after a group photowalked down to Downing Street. In support of the young people was Vas Blackwood better known as a comedy actor in the 'Lenny Henry Show', the 'Real MaCoy' and 'Desmonds' and two of Britain's newest and brightest black members of parliament Oona King (Bethnal Green and Bow) and David Lammy (Tottenham).

A delegation of young people went to number 10 Downing Street to hand in a copy of the NBYF Black Youth Charter to the Prime Minister, with Chandelle representing the Yorkshire and the Chapeltown massives. Unfortunately the Prime Minister Tony Blair had another pressing engagements, so a representative accepted the report on his behalf.

The event received national attention, with press and radio reporters interviewing the young people. The Black MP's were impressed by the content of the report and the turn out of over 70 young people from across the country. Not even the inclement weather or the delay on the trains could dampen the young people's enthusiasm.

The event came to a close with the group enjoying a meal in Brixton together and getting toknow one another. It also gave the opportunity for the core group to feed back information on NBYF activity. The NBYF will be on line from 23rd November 2000 at WWW.nbyf.com. On the web page with notice boards, articles, photos, updates on events, news and views about what's happening around the country. The group was also invited to informed that NBYF has become advisor to the government on issues such Connexions, they have also Strasbourg to speak to European Ministers on issues affecting black young people and there is more in the pipeline.

The Youth Services represented at the launch were Leeds, Cardiff, Blackburn, Manchester Stockport, Merseyside, St.Helens, Bedfordshire, Heartfordshire and London Boroughs. The turnout represents a fine example of Youth Services from across the country commitment towards race equality issues in support of young people.






