The Chapeltown Young People's 10-2 Club was founded in June/July 1992. It's now over 4 years old. It has over 50 registered members male and female aged 16-35. The club is intended for African Caribbean young people in the Chapeltown area of Leeds 7.

Club hours are 10 pm to 2 am, Wednesday and Friday nights.

Young people socialize over table, board and video games and take part in sessional activities including lectures, classes and discussions, performances, outings and day trips, residentials and conferences, exchange programmes and other activities of cultural, social, economic and educational interest.

Community Investment

Through New Trust For the last four years, Chel has given away any available surpluses that it makes to support small projects through its Community Development Fund. Although this has funded several worthwhile ideas in the community, there has not been enough money to make a big difference in Chapeltown & Harehills. Recognizing this, a new charitable trust has been formed called Chel Community Trust. This is a separate organization that will focus on trying to lever new cont'd next page

money into the area. A board of Trustees has been formed and aims have now been agreed. We will support regeneration in Chapeltown & Harehills through the celebration of diversity. We aim to help reposition the area as the Cultural Heart of Leeds over a sevenyear period. We will capitalize on the inherent cultural wealth of the area and use it to seek investment in new flagship projects. We will also be supporting small existing groups and individuals who have plans that contribute to the vision. As the Trust is new, its first job is to develop plans and approach funders for investment. Some ideas are already in the planning stage ù these include a Media Centre, a public piazza which can be used for local markets, and a Community Chest fund which can support a wide range of smaller projects and businesses. The Trust will help to create new independent community businesses as well as funnelling funding through to existing grass roots projects in the area. Chel will contribute any of its available surpluses to the Community Trust each year. We have also begun discussions with a range of other private and public sector funders who we believe can help to make the vision a reality. This area is brimming with cultural wealth and vitality ù let's use it, celebrate it and invest in it to bring Chapeltown & Harehills the standing that it deserves in the city.

Community Talent

The past and present media coverage has not shown Chapeltown in a positive light. This is because of two things. The influences who control the media rely on the communities to pass on positive as well as negative information about the area. The good which then happens in the community is being overlooked because the media doesn't reflect the positive, and sometimes the community neglects to pass on the information. No-one ever sees or tries to cover the positive side of Chapeltown, so here is just one of the many things which has happened on the sporting side of Chapeltown. The Mandela BMW Warriors & now the Yorkshire Premier cup winners & and the Mandela BMW Wildcats ù the Yorkshire Division One champions & both sponsored by Scotthall BMW Sheepscar Leeds, are just two out of the three teams based at the Mandela Centre who almost

came close to winning the double. The Mandela warriors who presently play in the Yorkshire Premiere League (National League Division 3) came runners-up behind their rivals the Menwithill Cavaliers, the founder cup winners. But revenge was to take place as both teams were to play in the Yorkshire Premier Cup semi-finals which took place at the Mandela Centre. The Mandela Warriors clinched it in the last second from a free throw taken by John Huggett with the final score ending at 86-85. They met Rawthorpe in the final whom they had beaten twice already in regular season. The finals proved to be exciting ones as Rawthorpe gave it their all in the first half but were overpowered in the second period of the game with the final score being 80-65. This season saw the starting of the regional play-offs. The Mandela Warriors were to qualify for this as they had been runners up in the Premiere League and the winners Menwithill Cavaliers weren't eligible due to their national status. The tournament took place in Cardiff and, as the Mandela Warriors were not given much time to prepare and were low on finance, help came from local electronic company ANKH Electronics. The competition was very tough but the Warriors played 4 games losing 2-1 to the home team Cardiff who became the eventual winners. And the Warriors runners up. They were also invited to a tournament in Manchester on June 1st where they were the outright winners, taking the trophies back to Leeds. The

Mandela BMW Wildcats became Yorkshire Division One Champions by winning 14 matches and only losing 2 games all season. They came runners-up in the Yorkshire Division One Cup by losing to their rivals Bradford University. The Mandela Basketball Team would like to thank Scotthall BMW for their continuous support through the good and bad times and because of that support we have got the best upand-coming juniors in the country. They would also like to thank ANKH Electronics for the financial support for the play-offs and all the fans and helpers past and present for their support and the Mandela Centre for their hospitality. 
