COSTUME DESIGNER PROFILE: SINCLAIR BROWN

What has been your favourite costume you designed?

If I had to choose my favourite costume, I would choose two the first one being 'The Lion Tamer' - my son wore it in 2010 Prince contest that came 3rd. The second is 'The Flock of Birds' - this was designed by Hughbon Condor.

What has inspired you to keep going and designing costumes?

I've made a lot of costume over years, with every costume being a favourite with special memories. I mainly make costumes for the Prince and Princess competition, for Leeds Caribbean carnival. I started, with the intension to encourage more local youngsters to get involved in Carnival. Then, I progressed onto making Carnival costume for my own kids.

I am fortunate to have worked with a wide range of designers over the years - Arthur France, Hughbon Condor, Rampage Carnival Arts & Huddersfield carnival groups. I get my inspiration from everyone I have worked with, from holidays and films. Mahogany Carnival Arts from London is one whose distinctive designs have left a strong impression on me.

What will keep the spark going in the carnival?

The crowd that turn up every year to support the Prince & Princess show, the King & Queen show, Soca Monarch show, J'ouvert Morning and the carnival procession on bank holiday Monday. But without the designers and their supporters, that design and create the costumes, there would be no carnival Spark.

Lastly, what plans do you have for the carnival this year or is it a secret ?

Unfortunately the plans for carnival costumes are always a guarded secret for all designers – all I can say is my favourite film is 'The Gladiator' starring Russell Crow and that's the only clue I can give..



COSTUME DESIGNER PROFILE: SHEILA HOWARTH

My first ever costume I designed myself was called Andromeda the fallen Star. I came second.

I felt I created something the community appreciated and from that moment I was hooked. I was 20.

All the way through school I felt I was in the shadows of the other students, but carnival brought me alive.



Carnival is like a drug - every year you have to design something. I work in a school and all summer long I design and



make carnival costumes with my brother for young people. This year carnival I am 60 and I have been involved with carnival as a participant and designer for nearly 50 years. Last year my brother and I designed the winning king and Queen and the winning Prince and Princess. It's the first time any designer has won all 4 titles.

This year my theme is the Beauty of the Caribbean. Carnival is my life. It brings communities together. We forget who we are and become one nation for one day, dancing and sharing food with your friends and enemies.

COSTUME DESIGNER PROFILE: HUGHBON CONDOR

What has been your favourite costume over the years?

I suppose that each period has had a different costume that I liked for different reasons. For this reason, to say that I have 1 favourite costume wouldn't be strictly true. I have many favourites for different reasons. For an instance my first winning costume was The Morning Glory in 1979. I really loved it because it was my first. In terms of inspiration, I also quiet enjoyed making one for my sister Lisa called a Sea Anemone It was quiet important



in terms of inspiration which was based around having seen the anemone at Roundhay tropical gardens. When I was walking in I didn't notice it but as when I was walking out I saw its beautiful tentacles so I came home and made one like it and it was another winning costume. Another one was for the 25th anniversary called the Peacock worn by Anmarie. Again that was very important to me in terms of design. It was the first time I had access to Fibre Glass. This specific material



allowed me to make very long feathers that trailed on the floor then I used my engineering mechanism to make the feathers rise up in the air to a vertical position and create a display similar to that of a peacock. Another quite important one to me was the caterpillar and a butterfly design. People still talk about it up to this day, a costume that came out looking like a caterpillar and converted into a butterfly.

There obviously are many more but I think that the "Man on hos back" was quite a tipping point for me because it was a full years project. It was the only 1 costume I made that year for the purpose to celebrate the bicentenary abolition of slavery so I was able to make that costume very much in celebration of a saying that my grandmother used to say, "man in a horse back nar see that" I designed the costume around that saying where you had the man on the horse. It represented the whole colonial slavery where the slave girl was dragged along the field by the man on the horse. When she got to the middle of the stage she had her hands freed. She then pretended to be a sugar cane worker. She chopped the whole scenery of the sugar cane down. She then felt somehow empowered after a while and decided to challenge the man on the horse. There was a tripping mechanism that allowed the horse to rear up and the

man fell off the horse. She then assisted in pulling him off and took his whip from him and whipped him a few times then climbed onto the horse and rode the horse. She then brought it down into a tamed position and led the horse into a new direction. This was one of my most creative expressions in terms of engineering costumes. When I was younger. I had said if I ever got to a point where I begin to do the same thing over and over again then I would stop making costumes. I always thought as I would get older I would run out of ideas, but fortunately the reverse has been the truth. I seem to have more and more ideas as I go along. I'm exposed to lots of ideas, thoughts, tools, materials techniques and so the opportunities to create greater innovations have expanded tremendously. I'm now doing lots of costumes that I would have only dreamt off in the past but now I have the facilities to make them. One thing about the way I design costumes is that I'm designing for lots of people not only in Leeds but at London, Preston, Huddersfield and Manchester. One of the things I have come across is the realisation that people need those types of costumes that they can pull apart and transport and store in a very small confined place in preference to a very big costume which could be nice on the day but difficult to store after the event. That is one of my strengths in term of being a designer that I build storage and transportation as part of my design criteria.

The younger generation has been taking carnival on board, for example my son is now a designer in his own right after a long time living under my shadow. For example, Sephon designed a troupe and a king costume, this year, entirely on his own and his son and Andre Pyke Condor is now working with his dad helping to create the costumes and are doing a wonderful job as well. I think carnival has a future if younger people take carnival on board and take on the responsibility for making costumes

I have designed a queen's costume around the theme of heaven and hell [the theme of the band]. It has the usual features of movement transformation and a surprising element to it; so hopefully the crowd will be entertained as they have always tended to be when they look at my costumes.

COSTUME DESIGNER PROFILE: ARTHUR FRANCE



One of my favourite costumes was the bi-centenary costume which celebrated 200 years when the act was passed to ban transportation of African slaves. To me that was a very important time in our lives.

I'm very passionate about Africa and our people and as you know carnival is a celebration of emancipation and people seem to see Africa in a negative stereotype. Even most of us who are Africans don't want to accept it so that what drives me and inspires me to undertake more research into who we are as a people and design costumes to portray our historical journey.

People have to be aware of who we are with a clear vision of where we are going and should not ever deviate from that journey once you set your eyes on the path of that journey. For me if it wasn't for the focus on Africa, this carnival couldn't last as lots of carnivals disappear without clear vision of progress

Plans are to be made to make it as successful as it should be of an effect

that no one could have ever seen an event like this. Being well organised is the most important fact for me and its also important when you look into most of my friends who were here when we were students. Together they will be coming back from all parts of the world and most of us haven't seen each other for over forty odd years. We would be having the premium at because I was born at Nevis and the people in Nevis, being extremely proud of Nevisian deciding to set up something that means a lot to us as a people and to see how many people recognise that and comeback to support it.

We have hit all the spots including the biggest events anywhere in the north of England ever. The financial impact of the whole celebration of us as African people to me, means more than anything else.

When one considers the performance of the last year that a hundred and sixty thousand people had attended the carnival and not a single arrest was made, one may realise my passion.

CARNIVAL FACTS

PRINCIPLES

- 1. Mas/Masquerade The extravagant Carnival costumes made by an army of volunteers for the processions of dancers.
- 2. Steel Drum Also known as steel pan, these Trinidadian instruments are made from old oil drums. It is the only acoustic instrument invented in the 20th century.
- 3. Calypso a traditional of political or social comment based in satire and rhyme.
- 4. Soca high-energy Trinidadian carnival music (Soul/Calypso).
- 5. Sound Systems originally from Jamaica, they blast out kilowatts of bass-driven hip hop, reggae, dance music, soca and soul.

SAFETY

- Meet up with friends before you arrive at the Carnival
- Don't arrange to meet at busy junctions these will get very congested
- Have a set meeting place in case you get lost or separated
- Don't rely on mobile phones as reception may be affected by the large crowds
- Be on the alert for pickpockets and for any unattended bags or suspect packages
- Don't wear expensive jewellery or carry too much cash. Criminals are attracted to large crowds
- Drink lots of water, it's a long day and it can get hot out there!
- Wear flat shoes and comfortable clothing. Ladies, leave your heels at home!



Chapeltown Children's Play Scheme celebrates - Carnival 50th Anniversary As part of a year-long events celebrating the Leeds West Indian Carnival 50th Anniversary, Mr Arthur France MBE (better known as Leeds own 'Mr Carnival') was invited to speak to a group of 50 children aged 5 - 12 years old. They all attend the Chapeltown Community Play Scheme, based at the Hillcrest Academy in the Chapeltown area of Leeds. Mr France spoke about the origins of the carnival in the back in Caribbean; it links to slavery and the first every carnival in Leeds in 1967.

He said, 'the first Carnival was organised as a way of helping people from the Caribbean to come to terms being far away from home - missing the sun, the tropical climate, sandy beaches and the cultural celebrations..' The Carnival was a way of staving off the feeling of

home sickness. Now, 50 years on, he is talking to a room of younger children who some are related to the first African Caribbean people that came to England in the 1960s. He recognised some of the children as grandchildren of many people he new personally. There were also, some children from Eastern Europe, who said they loved the colours and the costumes at carnival time. Also, in attendance was another familiar person ward member Sharon Hamilton, who stood in for other counsellors who were unable to make this special event for the kids.

The kids would like to thank Arthur and Sharon for coming to see them and wish the Carnival and all participants a wonderful 50th year of celebration.





ALL AH WE ARE MIGRANTS







Our masquerade for the 50th Leeds West Indian Carnival partners with the David Oluwale Memorial Association. We express the progress and pain of migration. Adorned in hibiscus flowers we represent the beauty and joy that migrants bring when they are allowed to flourish. A huge inflated life-jacket, and masqueraders in their own life-jackets, remind us how fraught the migrants' journey across the seas has been. Our King expresses the particular plight of David Oluwale, a British Citizen who came to Leeds in 1949. He fell on difficult times. Persecuted, beaten and chased by police, he drowned in the River Aire in 1969. We depict our King David smiling, emerging from and returning to water. We want Leeds to champion diversity and hospitality, through Carnival's spirit and in David's name; we must remember him.

HB Mama Dread's Masqueraders have taken part in Leeds Carnival since 1998, supported by Ison Harrison Solicitors. Established by local solicitor Ruth Bundey, with her friend and dress-maker Athaliah Durrant, we learn about carnival design, costume cutting, decoration and production, often collaborating with Hughbon Condor from High Esteem Designs.

Our mas' draws attention to and speaks about contemporary social and cultural issues. We tell stories through our costumes, banners, music and dance. In past years we have produced 'Judge Dread – Innocent Til Proven Guilty' highlighting those unfairly imprisoned, 'Love Ghetto Connection' bringing people together, 'Shame on You BP' about the Exxon oil slick in Alaska, 'Free Dem', representing the 200th anniversary of the Abolition of Slavery, and 'Unstitch the Rich' after the banking crisis in 2008.

We are all Migrants! HB Mama Dread's Masqueraders



We develop the design and production skills of the Harrison Bundey Mama Dread carnival troupe. We are producing a design and costumes for a King and 150 troupe members including Little London Primary School children, to perform at Leeds West Indian Carnival's 50th Anniversary in August 2017. Our designs link and celebrate historical and contemporary migration. We collaborate with 'Remember Oluwale', a campaign raising awareness of the story of the Nigerian who drowned in the River Aire in 1969 (www.rememberoluwale.org)

Our project will be documented by Leeds Beckett University Northern Film School and we have a social media presence to help tell our story.

Harrison Bundey (HB) carnival troupe has existed as a diverse group of volunteers for over 20 years, participating annually in Leeds West Indian Carnival. Established by local solicitor Ruth Bundey, based in Chapeltown Leeds with friend and dress maker Athaliah Durrant, the group formally constituted itself in October 2016. We have received annual financial support over this time from the Carnival committee, HB solicitors, sponsors and our members. Troupe members learn about carnival design, costume cutting, decoration and production and various carnival arts skills. For major pieces we have worked with Hughbon Condor from High Esteem Designs and Callaloo Arts. Our diverse troupe includes children, teenagers, adults and elders, including those in and out of work. Each year we have costumed a troupe of between 50 and 100 children and adults from across our multi-cultural community. Uniquely we draw attention to and speak to contemporary social and cultural issues. We tell stories through our costumes, banners, music and dance. Troupe titles reflect this, like 'Judge Dread - Innocent Til Proven Guilty' highlighting those unfairly imprisoned and 'Shame on You BP' about the Exxon oil slick in Alaska. We were selected for Heritage Lottery support in 2006 to design a troupe - 'Free Dem', representing the 200th anniversary of the Abolition of Slavery. 'Unstitch the Rich' troupe was featured in an Arts Council film produced by Callaloo Arts in 2013.

Our masquerade design for 2017 expresses the progress and pain of migration. Adorned in hibiscus flowers we represent the beauty and joy that migrants bring when they are allowed to flourish. Inflated life-jackets float above us to remind us how fraught the migrants' journey across the seas has been. Our King expresses the particular plight of David Oluwale. Our banners, truck design and the items we hand to those who line the streets explain our message: we are all migrants; we all seek sanctuary and a safe home; we all can make a better world.
